FIRST DAY.

The Red River Baptist Association met with White Oak Church Oct. 1, 1892, at 10 a. m., and was called to order by the former Moderator. Introductory sermon preached by Eld. J. F. Whitson, appointee, from 2 Cor. 12:2. Adjourned to meet at 2:30 p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Met at 2:30 p. m. Called to order by Moderator; prayer by Bro. Holt.

COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

We, your Committee on Education, beg leave to report the

following: '

Considering the immense progress made in all branches of knowledge, and the necessity of our keeping abreat of this advancement, we recommend that free and full use be made of all means available for the dissemination of light and knowledge among our people; but in the selection of high schools and colleges that preference be given to our denominational institutions. Further; while we highly appreciate the eminent services and usefulness of many of our ministers who have not had the advantages of a thorough and liberal education, we yet believe that a sound theological education will increase their power and efficiency, especially in confuting the numerous heresies of the day and defending the doctrines as delivered unto the saints.

ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

We, your Committee on Sunday Schools, would respectfully

teport the following:

We find from the letters from the churches to this Association that there are in operation within the bounds of the Associaonly three Baptist Sunday schools with a membership of 165; officers and teachers, 17; number of books in library, 100. That from said schools there have been two conversions. That said schools have contributed during the year for school expenses, \$32; for Foreign Mission, \$9.50; to Orphans Home, \$43.50; to state Sunday schools, \$2; to the poor, \$20; total during the year, \$106.85.

We recommend that this body encourage Baptist Sunday schools, organized under the direction of Baptist churches. We express our deep regret at the state of indifference among our churches, and almost universal neglect of Sunday schools by our

ministers. We recommend a close study of Christ's last words in the commission, and pray for the guidance of the Holy Spirit in our Sunday schools.

make the following report:

We very much regret to have to report that while there is very great destitution in our midst, there has been no missionary work done in our bounds by our denomination during the Associational year just closing. We hope that such will not be the case during the coming year. We have had blessings in the work in past years, which should stimulate us to greater work. There are several churches within our boundary that are useful churches in the work of the Master, which are the fruits of Missionary work. We call special attention to the fact that not one petitionary letter was presented for membership in our body at this session, while at our former sessions we have nearly always had from one to three applications for membership with us, coming from churches organized by our Missionaries. Brethren, let this be a

solemn warning to us, and let us resolve that by the help of God we will keep a Missionary at work in our bounds at least half, if not all the year.

ON STATE MISSIONS.

We, your Committee on State Missions, beg leave to make

the following report:

Texas is our field. What a magnificent territory; unparalleled resources. Right on our own border and about us are thousands that must hear the gospel through our labor and efforts in our missionary work in the next decade. The countries of Mexico, under God depends upon our efforts. We can and ought to do more than heretofore, because of the success of the past. Most of the leading churches in Texas are the result of the State Mission work in the past, and this should stimulate us for the future, besides the needs should urge us on to efforts. There are 2,000,000 people in Texas who are out of Christ. This should emphasize the importance of the work. The Baptists number more than two-fifths of the church membership of the state, excepting Romanism. We have over 207,000 Baptists in Texas. Last year, or the Association year just closed, we had 143 Missionaries employed; organized 107 churches, with a membership of 1,173; had 2,432 baptisms; 3,812 professed conversion, besides efficient Sunday school work! distributed 814, 693 pages of religious literature; built 33 church houses at a cost of \$22,460; collected \$35,570.

The success we have had should encourage us to go on in the work. Brethren, this is our centennial mission year. Let us look back for the century and take courage and say, the Lord be praised for past success. May the Lord be with us, bless and help us in this, the Lord's work.
