September 3, 4, 5, 1952

#### WEDNESDAY NIGHT

The services opened at 8:00 p.m. with singing, "Are You Washed in the Blood?" led by Eld. R. T. Stevens, with Mrs. Henry Shipp at the piano. The opening prayer was led by Eld. J. B. Watson. After another song and prayer, Moderator H. L. Johnston opened the 109th Annual Session of the Association. Eld. Johnston welcomed the assembly into the church. After another song and prayer, the services were turned to Eld. G. F. Crumley, who had been selected in 1951, to bring the annual sermon. The message text was, Exodus 20:5; the subject, "A Jealous God." After the message, the congregation was dismissed by prayer, to meet again Thursday morning at 10:00 o'clock.

#### THURSDAY MORNING

The services were opened by singing, "When I See the Blood," led by Eld. G. F. Crumley, with Mrs. G. F. Crumley at the piano. The opening prayer was led by Eld. J. A. Rester. After another song and prayer, the Rules of Decorum were read by Moderator H. L. Johnston, and the Association was opened for business. A motion carried, by Eld. A. L. Bond that all visiting brethren be seated in counsel with us.

Reading Clerks appointed by the Moderator, were Elds. L. H. Owens, and C. O. Rhyne. The Associational Letters showed three (3) churches to have extended an invitation for the 1953 Annual Session of the Association: Maple Creek, New Haven, Post Oak.

At this time, nominations opened for a preacher to bring the message at the 11:00 o'clock hour. Nominated were Elds. J. A. Rester, A. J. Kirkland, A. J. Findley, and R. E. Rodgers. Elected was Eld. A. J. Kirkland.

After the preacher was elected, the Assembly enjoyed a brief recess.

After the recess, a motion carried that the letters be accepted as read, and the Messengers be seated.

The Assembly sang, "How Firm a Foundation," led by Eld. R. T. Stevens. Dr. Kirkland was called to the stand, and he chose as his text, Psalm 2:12, the Scripture reading the entire Second Psalm, and the subject, "The Present Day Outlook of This World." Dr. Kirkland brought a wonderful, soul-stirring message.

Announcements were called for, and the congregation was dismissed in prayer by the Moderator.

#### WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

This session opened by singing, "When We All Get to Heaven," with the opening prayer led by Eld. H. L. McNish. One other letter was read and the messengers seated.

Nominations for the Officers of the Association were declared to be in order.

Nominated for Moderator were Elds. R. T. Stevens, and H. L. Johnston. A motion prevailed to suspend the regular order of business and vote by acclamation. Elected as Moderator was Eld. R. T. Stevens. Motion carried to make the vote unanimous for Brother Stevens.

Nominated and elected as Clerk was Eld. G. F. Crumley.

Nominated as Treasurer were Eld. A. I. Bond, and Bro. Robert Tull. Elected was Bro. Robert F. Tull.

A motion carried to receive the Pinkham Memorial Missionary Baptist Church of DeKalb in the fellowship of the Association and seat her messengers. The motion carried to have the Moderator give to the messengers the right hand of fellowship.

Miscellaneous business declared to be in order.

Nine visiting preachers were introduced.

A motion carried to table a proposed change in the Constitution and make it a special order of business for 9:30 a.m. Friday.

At this time a Finance Committee and a Committee on Divine Services were appointed.

The motion that in the event a Local Missionary is not put on the field, the balance of money in the Association Treasury be given to the Pinkham Memorial Baptist Church in DeKalb.

The Committees on State Missions, Christian Education, Associational Missions, and Interstate and Foreign Missions were appointed by the Moderator.

The Report of the Committee on Interstate and Foreign Missions read by Eld. A. L. Patterson. A motion carried to adopt the Report, after discussion by Eld. Patterson.

The Report of the Committee on Christian Education was read by Chairman A. J. Kirkland. A motion carried to adopt the Report. Discussing the Report were Brethren A. J. Kirkland, C. O. Rhyne, and E. C. Gillentine.

At this time, nominations for the place of meeting in 1953 were declared in order. Invitations were extended from the Maple Creek Baptist Church, New Haven Baptist Church, and Post Oak Baptist Church. The invitation of the New Haven Church was accepted.



For a place of meeting for the next Fifth Sunday Meeting, an invitation was extended by representatives of the Post Oak Baptist Church. This invitation was accepted.

An invitation for the next Fellowship meeting was extended by the West Side Baptist Church of New Boston, and this invitation was accepted.

The New Haven Baptist Church and the Friendship Baptist Church extended invitations for the new Worker's Meeting to meet with her, and the invitation of the New Haven Baptist Church was accepted.

The Report of the Committee on Old Minister's Relief was read by Chairman A. S. Crow. A motion carried to adopt the Report, and was discussed by Brethren A. S. Crow and John Askew. The Report recommended that an offering be taken for Old Minister's Relief. The amount of the offering was \$18.84, which was given to the two widows of preachers in the Association.

At this time, announcements were called for, and a motion was made to adjourn until around 7:30 p.m. The Assembly was dismissed with prayer, led by Eld. E. C. Gillentine.

#### THURSDAY NIGHT

Services were opened with singing, "O I Want to See Him," led by Eld. G. F. Crumley, with Mrs. Crumley at the piano. Prayer was led by Bro. Morris Downs.

Devotional services were conducted by Eld. Charlie Gammill, who read as Scripture reading Matthew 3:11. After the Devotional another song was sung, "At the Cross," followed by prayer, led by Eld. J. B. Watson.

The selection for the preacher of the hour was Eld. R. E. Rodgers, of Henderson, Texas, who was called to the stand to bring the evening message. As his Scripture lesson, Eld. Rodgers read Acts 26:12-19. His Text was Verse 19, and the subject, "Obedience to Our Heavenly Vision." After a truly great message, the Moderator called for an offering to State Missions. The amount of the offering was \$21.07.

Announcements were made and the Assembly adjourned until 9:30 a.m. Friday. The congregation was dismissed with prayer, led by the Moderator.

#### FRIDAY MORNING

The services were opened by singing, "Sweet Hour of Prayer," led by Eld. H. L. Johnston, with Eld. G. F. Crumley at the piano. Prayer was led by Brother J. T. Dennis.

The Special Order of Business was called for. A motion was made to adopt a Resolution, changing Article 9 of the Constitution. Discussing the motion was Eld. G. F. Crumley. The motion carried, and Article 9 of the Constitution was amended to read: "The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, a Clerk, and a Treasurer, who shall be chosen annually by a majority vote of the assembled messengers, and shall hold office for one year, or until their successors are chosen."

The Report of the Committee on Associational Missions was read by Chairman A. J. Findley. A motion carried to adopt the Report, which was discussed by Brethren A. J. Findley, J. B. Watson, John Askew, J. T. Dennis, H. L. Johnston, G. F. Crumley.

A motion carried to employ a full-time Missionary, to be placed on the field at a salary of \$275.00 per month.

A motion carried to name a date, and invite Eld. Troy May of Hayworth, Oklahoma to meet with Missionary Committee, and discuss the possibility of his going on the field as Missionary, the date to be at 2:00 p.m. at the Fellowship Meeting with the West Side Baptist Church of New Boston.

The Report of the Committee on State Missions was read by the Moderator. A motion carried to adopt the Report, discussed by Elds. A. J. Findley, and H. L. Johnston.

The Report of the Committee on Denominational Literature was read by the Clerk. A motion carried to adopt the Report, discussed by Eld. G. F. Crumley.

A motion carried to discontinue the regular order of business, and have preaching.

The report of the Committee on Orphans' Home was read by Bro. Parsons. A motion carried to adopt the Report. Discussing the Report were Brethren J. B. Watson, Jim Pollock, and R. F. Tull. An offering was taken as recommended in the Report, amounting to \$16.09.

A motion carried to make the Fellowship Day in September each year an annual Orphans' Home Rally day.

A motion carried that the Moderator notify each Church in the Association of the Rally Day and the Mission question.

After a recess, the Assembly was called together by singing, "O How I Love Jesus," with prayer led by R. E. Tull.

The choice of the Committee on Divine Services to bring the message of the hour, was Eld. A. J. Findley, who was called to the stand. His Scripture Reading was Hebrews 11:32-40; 12:1, 2. The Text was I John 5:4, 5, and the Subject, "A Victorious Faith." Brother Findley brought a wonderful, soul-stirring message.

After the message, the Moderator called for announcements, and the Assembly was dismissed with prayer, led by Eld. H. L. Johnston.

#### FRIDAY AFTERNOON

The Assembly was called together by singing, "There Is a Fountain," led by Eld. H. L. Johnston. The opening prayer was led by Brother Bryant Elliott.

The Report of the Committee on Sunday School was read by the Clerk, and a motion carried to adopt the Report.

The Report of the Committee on Temperance was read by Eld. A. J. Findley. A motion carried to adopt the Report, discussed by Brother Findley.

The motion carried that all Associational Missionary money be given to the Pinkham Memorial Baptist Church in the event a local Missionary was not employed.

The Finance Committee Report was read, and a motion carried to adopt, after being discussed by Brother J. T. Dennis.

A motion carried that the money for Old Ministers' Relief be equally divided between the two widows of preachers in our Association.

A motion carried that the Clerk have 200 Minutes printed.

The motion carried that the Moderator insert on the cards to be written to each Church that the Churches be requested to take an offering to defray expenses of printing the Minutes.

A Resolution of Thanks was read and adopted. The response to the Resolution of Thanks was given by Eld. H. L. Johnston on behalf of the Avery Church. Discussing the Resolution were Brehren R. H. Tull, A. J. Findley, G. F. Crumley, R. T. Stevens, and John Askew.

The Report of the Treasurer was given.

Nominated and elected to bring the Annual Sermon in 1953, was Eld. H. L. Johnston. The Alternate was Eld. J. B. Watson.

A motion carried to adjourn until Wednesday night, September 2, 1953.

The congregation was dismissed by singing "Gathering Home," with prayer led by Sister W. F. Brooks.

## CONSTITUTION

Article 1.—This Body shall be known as the Red River-Bowie Missionary Baptist Association.

Article 2.—The object of this Body shall be to awaken a deeper interest in the welfare of the denomination, to cultivate a closer union between the churches, and to produce and perpetuate the very greatest activity as to missionary and educational enterprises, and to widen the scope of denominational benevolence.

Article 3.—This body shall be composed of such regular Baptist Churches as may agree to unite with this Association by means of messengers to carry out the objects set forth in Article 2 of this Constitution; such messengers to present letters of petition for administration from their respective churches.

Article 4.—The messengers holding the annual session of this Body shall be chosen by their respective churches, such action being certified by the churches in their letters to the Association.

Article 5.—Each Church composing this Body shall be entitled to three messengers.

Article 6.—This Association shall be in nature a joint auxiliary to the churches composing it. It is not formed by any ecclesiastical end, but merely benevolent purposes, but reserves the right to withdraw from any church which becomes heterodox in faith or disorderly in practice.

Article 7.—Each Church shall be the sole judge of her messengers.

Article 8.—The Association shall recognize freedom of speech as essential to the highest achievement of its work.

## OFFICERS

Article 9.—The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, a Clerk, and a Treasurer, who shall be chosen annually by a majority vote of the assembled messengers, and shall hold office for one year or until, their successors are chosen.

Article 10.—It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside over the Body, to keep order, and discharge such other duties as belong to the office.

Article 11.—It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a correct record of each session of this Body and to have same published and distributed to the churches as the report of the Association to the churches.

Article 12.—It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to keep a correct account of all money received and disbursed, and he shall make a report of same to the Association during its annual session.

Article 13.—This Association shall have an Executive Committee composed of one member from each Church in this Association to be chosen by their respective Churches at the time the Church elects its messengers to the annual meeting of the Association, to report at the next annual session of the Association. Five members of the said committee shall compose a quorum; the Moderator to be the chairman of the said committee, to have charge of the work outlined by the messengers to the annual meeting of the Body.

Article 14.—In order to change or amend this Constitution, the amendment or amendments must be offered in writing and said amendment or amendments must be over until the second day's meeting, and then it shall take a two-thirds vote of the messengers present to change or amend the Constitution.

Article 15.—This Constitution shall be effective and in full force from and after its adoption.
